RECYCLE CURBSIDE

- Air conditioners
- Aseptic containers
- Barbeque grills
- Batteries (AA, C, D, Button)
- Bicycles
- Cardboard boxes
- Glass bottles and jars
- Hot water tanks
- Junk mail
- Lawn mowers
- Papers
- Paperback books
- Plastic containers
- Refrigerators
- Washing machines

CUT TO SIZE

- Logs: Cut to 2 feet long, or less, and bundle as trash
- Lumber: Cut to 4 feet long, or less, and bundle as trash

TRASH/YARD WASTE/OTHER

- Shrubs: Small ones in yard waste container; others in trash
- Styrofoam: Use elsewhere or trash
- Tires: Take to tire installation store
- Toilets: Trash
- Tree stumps: Contact your city or private hauler
- Twigs: Yard waste

RECYCLE AT DROP-OFF CENTER

Everything that goes in your recycling bin plus:

- Batteries (auto, boat, lantern, lead acid)
- CD, DVD, VHS tapes and cassettes, Floppy Discs (cases recycled separately)
- Clothes, shoes, toys and blankets
- Hardcover books
- Paper shredding available
- Plastic bags

TAKE TO TRANSFER STATION FOR A FEE

- Auto parts
- Building materials
- Concrete
- Demolition material
- Shingles

BY APPOINTMENT (248) 288-5153

- Chemicals
- Compact fluorescent bulbs
- Computer equipment
- Cooking oil
- Electronic equipment
- Fluorescent light bulbs
- Gasoline

REPORT ALL SCAVENGERS TO YOUR CITY

BLUE AND GREEN GLASS



Now accepting all glass bottles and jars: clear, brown, blue, and green

ASEPTIC CONTAINERS

Empty food and beverage boxes, milk cartons, paper cups, drink & juice boxes.



HOLIDAY INTERRUPTIONS

When one of the following holidays falls on a weekday, collection for the holiday and remaining days of the week will be delayed one day:

- New Year's Day
- Memorial Day
- Independence Day
- Labor Day
- Thanksgiving
- Christmas Day

RECYCLING

What can I recycle at the curb?

- All papers, newspapers, magazines, mail, paperback books and paperboard boxes
- All plastic containers that fit in your bin
- Cardboard boxes
- Glass bottles and jars
- Empty metal cans and small scrap metal objects
- Household batteries in clear baggie
- Large metal items such as BBQ grills, bicycles, appliances, etc.



How do I prepare recyclables?

Set clean, acceptable recyclables in your curbside recycle bin. Large metal items should be placed near your recycle bin. Residents may use more than one recycle bin. Cardboard must be flattened and either taped together or stuffed into another box. Filled bins or boxes cannot weigh more than 60 pounds each.

YARD WASTE

What is yard waste?

Grass clippings, leaves, spent flowers and garden plants, weeds, pine needles, pine cones, acorns, chestnuts, walnuts, apples, pumpkins, corn cobs and husks, prunings, potting soil, shrub clippings, clean dirt, straw, mulch, small shrubs, vines and twigs.



How do I prepare yard waste for collection?

Yard waste may be placed in 35-gallon trash cans, clearly labeled or marked with a "yard waste" sticker (available at city offices) or 30-gallon paper yard waste bags available at most hardware stores. Containers or bags cannot weigh more than 50 pounds each. Berkley residents are required to purchase tags for yard waste collection during specific times each year. Please contact Berkley for more information.

Why must I separate these items?

Yard waste is banned from disposal in Michigan landfills. SOCRRA converts yard waste into compost, a useful nutrient-rich soil amendment.

What about brush and branches larger than twigs?

See Brush.

Is yard waste collected year-round?

No, weekly curbside collection is provided from the first Monday in April through the third Friday in December.

What if I have yard waste when collection isn't provided?

SOCRRA residents can bring yard waste to the SOCRRA Transfer Station at 995 Coolidge Road in Troy at no charge from mid-December through March. Check the SOCRRA website at (www.socrra.org) for exact dates.

BRUSH

What is brush?

Brush is generally considered to be branches larger than 2 inches in diameter. Small twigs are not considered brush and should be placed with yard waste.



What do I do with brush?

Residents of Berkley, Birmingham, Ferndale, Hazel Park, Lathrup Village & Oak Park are to neatly stack 4 to 12 foot long branches (up to 6-inch diameter) at the curb, with large ends closest to the street, so they can be chipped by their City's contractor or, branches can be cut into 4 to 4 1/2 foot lengths, bundled with twine and placed at curb to be collected as trash (bundles cannot weigh more than 40 pounds). Residents of Beverly Hills, Clawson, Pleasant Ridge, Royal Oak & Troy are to cut branches 4 to 4 1/2 feet long, bundle and place at curb, for collection as trash, or hire a private contractor to chip branches. Residents of Huntington Woods are to neatly stack 4 to 12 foot long branches (up to 6-inch diameter) for chipping by the City's contractor.

What about logs, firewood and lumber?

These items are not brush. Logs or firewood must be cut to 2 foot lengths or less, bundled and set to the curb for trash collection. Lumber must be cut to 4 foot lengths or less, bundled and set to the curb for trash collection. Bundles cannot weigh more than 60 pounds.

TRASH

How do I prepare trash for collection?

Place trash out by 7:00 AM. Place in bags or cans no larger than 35-gallons. Bags cannot weigh more than 40 pounds and cans cannot weigh more than 60 pounds.



How do I dispose of large items such as a sofa, old carpet or a refrigerator?

Large items may be set to the curb for collection on your regular trash day. Carpet must be cut and bundled in 4 foot lengths. Refrigerator doors must be removed and set next to unit for safety reasons. Refrigerators will be collected for recycling.

Is there anything I cannot put out for trash collection?

Yes, there are certain items that are not collected in SOCRRA communities including household hazardous waste (see below). See EXCLUDED ITEMS for additional information.

What about household hazardous waste?

Residents of SOCRRA's member communities are provided with convenient and effective ways of disposing of household waste products that require special handling, processing and disposal such as paints, pesticides, solvents, motor oil and insulin syringes. Materials are collected by appointment only. Please call (248) 288-5153 to schedule an appointment.

What about electronics like computers and TVs?

Residents of SOCRRA's member communities can make an appointment at SOCRRA's Troy facility to take items such as computer monitors, televisions, CPUs, printers, radios, telephones and fax machines for recycling. Please call (248) 288-5153 to schedule an appointment.

EXCLUDED CURBSIDE ITEMS

There are certain items that are **NOT** acceptable for curbside collection:

- Liquids
- Radioactive items
- Flammable products
- Explosives
- Infectious materials
- Asbestos insulation
- Tires
- Hazardous waste
- Tree stumps
- Engines
- Transmissions
- Rear axles
- Construction items from a private contractor's work
- Loose items: Bricks, broken concrete or dirt

These materials must be disposed of privately. See www.socrra.org or call (248) 288-5150 for locations, hours, rates and procedures. Limited amounts of construction items from home occupant's personal repair or remodeling are acceptable; however, items cannot be longer than 4 feet in length.
